

Social Distancing

- Keep within the safety of your truck — do not enter the scale house
- As always – remain in the cab of the truck to minimize the potential for exposure both at the aggregate site and at the customer site
- No ridesharing
- Minimize exposure to employees/contractors and maintain social distancing of at least 6 feet
- Do not allow others to directly touch your truck – or your controls
- Where possible, drive the same equipment every day
- Conduct safety meetings and all other communications by radio

Dispatch and Ticketing

- Aggregate producers are working with customers to accept electronic daily ticket summaries so that you don't have to get signatures.
- When you pick up the load, instead of signing the ticket, the scale operator might ask you for your initials.
- When you deliver the load simply ask for the name of the person accepting it and keep a log or write it down on your ticket.
- Scale operators can also write the plate and/or truck unit number on the ticket

Cleaning and Disinfecting

- Wash your hands according to the WHO guidelines
- Disinfect your truck on an on-going basis – knobs, steering wheel, door handles, door sides, gear shift, etc.
- Wear gloves when fueling or touching any surfaces – and then wash those gloves daily
- Carry hand sanitizer and wipes in vehicle if possible to use after making stops and wipe regularly touched areas in truck where required as noted above

Equipment / Maintenance

- Social distancing between co-workers in the service bays
- Service techs to disinfect truck when completed repairs – knobs, steering wheel, door handles, door sides, gear shift, etc.
